SECTION E Building Protection Zone - Where a dwelling exists on your property you are required to have a Building Protection Zone for minimum of 20 metres measured from any external wall of a dwelling. Subject to the required clearing permit being obtained, a property owner may extend the Building Protection Zone to a maximum of 40 metres. For all outbuildings on your property you need only to comply with Clause 1 in this Section. Remove all flammable material within 20 metres of any dwelling or outbuilding. Tree trunks to be free of branches to a height of 2 metres. 2. 2m 3. No trees are to over hang the dwelling. No tall shrub over 1 metre in height or live standing tree is to be located within 2 metres from any part of a dwelling. 4. 5. Shrubs are not to be located under trees, are not to be planted in clumps greater than 5m<sup>2</sup> in area, clumps of shrubs should be separated by at least 5 metres. 6. The Shire of Manjimup permits the clearing of live standing trees in the Building Protection Zone subject to the land owner obtaining a clearing permit from the Department of Environment Regulation. Please contact the Shire of Manjimup for assistance. Fuel Hazard Reduction Bush lands - Forest fuel in your bush land must not exceed the following parameters for your property. (Sampling and fuel calculation should be as approved by the Department of Fire & Emergency Services procedures) Karri: 15 tonnes per hectare = 1500 grams of forest fuel per square metre. Jarrah / Marri: 8 tonnes per hectare = 800 grams of forest fuel per square metre. Mixed Forest: 15 tonnes per hectare = 1500 grams of forest fuel per square metre. Acceptable methods of fuel hazard reduction include Hand Clearing, Mechanical Clearing, Park Land Clearing, Fuel Hazard Reduction Burning. SECTION D Where Bush Land exists on your property A Trafficable firebreak clear of all Flammable Material and not less than 3 metres wide shall be constructed immediately inside the external boundary of all land and be maintained throughout the fire season. Turn around areas designed to accommodate a 3.4 fire fighting appliance must be constructed every 500 metres. SECTION E Where strategic firebreaks are located on your land, they must be maintained in accordance with this notice or approved subdivision plans, whichever requirement is greater. SECTION F Construct a trafficable firebreak of not less than 15 metres wide around and inside the boundaries of all plantations established after 2009 (ex-1. isting plantations established in 2009 or earlier require a firebreak of 10 metres wide). Construct a trafficable firebreak not less than 6 metres wide within the plantation so as to divide the plantation into compartments not exceeding 2 30 hectares each. 3. Maintain all firebreaks in a Trafficable condition. Trees on both sides of the firebreaks are to be pruned to a minimum height of 5 metres to allow for unrestricted access to all maintenance and fire fighting vehicles so as to maintain an effective firebreak width. Where dwellings exist within 100 metres of a Plantation, no Plantation trees shall be planted within 50 metres of any existing or proposed dwell-4 ing. A further 50 metres of plantation should be pruned and have ground fuels reduced so as to provide a minimum of a 100 metre low fuel zone area immediately surrounding any dwelling. SECTION G Abutting a Residential Zone - Where rural land, whether bushland or pastured, abuts a residential zone boundary a 3 metre firebreak shall be 1 constructed along the common boundary of the residential zone. 2. Bushland - Where bushland exceeds more than 1 hectare and abuts a boundary, a trafficable firebreak of not less than 3 metres must be constructed along the boundary and within 15 metres of that boundary. Grain Crops - Shall have a 3 metre firebreak around the perimeter of the crop, this firebreak is to remain in place unit the crop is harvested. 3 During harvesting of the crop you must have an operational fire fighting unit full of water (not less than 600 litres) located within the paddock being harvested Fuel Storage / Hay Sheds - Shall have constructed a 6 metre firebreak immediately adjacent to any fuel storage and or hay sheds. 4

#### CTIO

- Fuel Hazard Reduction All flammable material mowed and maintained at a level not exceeding 100mm and maintained throughout the fire 1. season.
- Dwelling / Outbuilding Where a dwelling or outbuilding exists on your property you need to remove all flammable material within 20 metres 2 from any external walls of that building.

Where a Fire Management Plan exists for a Subdivision or a property, the requirements of the plan needs to be in place.

### **Definitions**

**Bush Land:** Land other than pastured or grassed land including plantations of less than 8 hectares.

**External Boundary:** Means the external perimeter boundary of contiguous land contained within the same ownership, irrespective of whether it contains one or more allotments.

Fire Break: Means a trafficable portion of land being the prescribed width and height and clear of all flammable material, litter and forest fuels.

Flammable Material: Means accumulated fuel (living or dead) such as leaf litter, twigs, bark, dead trees and grass over the height of 100mm and anything deemed by an Authorised Officer to be capable of combustion. Flammable Material excludes cultivated plants located in gardens, fruit or vegetables plants, live standing trees or approved structures.

Forest Fuel: Is any combustible material, dead or alive, in isolation, in clusters or aggregated with other combustible materials. It includes but is not limited to vegetation both on the ground and suspended leaves, sticks, fallen branches, twigs and bracken. This definition excludes live standing trees.

Fire Season: Means the period of time set out as the Restricted and Prohibited burning season and any variation. When applying "Fire Season" to the summary of requirements for your property the start dates are (Zone 8 - 11 December 2019 & Zone 6 - 18 December 2019).

Grassed Land: Land used for the purpose of grazing or cropping.

Litter: Means leaves, small sticks, twigs and branches immediately above the soil surface.

Live standing tree: Means perennial plant having a permanent woody, self-supporting main stem or trunk, usually growing to considerable height and usually developing branches at some distance from the ground. Live standing trees exhibit a distinct crown of foliage with a stem diameter at breast height of at least 100mm. A live standing tree will continue to have sap movement along the cambium layer (layer of living cells) located under the bark.

**Plantations:** Land upon which any pine or eucalypt species of tree is planted on an area exceeding 8 hectares.

**Plantation Boundary:** Shall mean contiguous parcels of land under separate ownership, lease or any form of contractual or financial arrangements whatsoever.

Town Site Land: All land located within the gazetted townsite boundaries of Manjimup, Pemberton, Northcliffe, Walpole, and Settlements of Jardee, Palgarup, Quinninup, Nyamup, Windy Harbour and Deanmill.

**Trafficable:** Means a portion of land free from overhanging trees, limbs or vegetation or any other natural or man made object to a vertical height of 5 metres, traversable by a large fire fighting appliance.

**Park Land Clearing:** Means the removal of forest fuels whilst leaving live standing trees and predominate vegetation so as to maintain a reasonable forest fuel load at the required standard or below.

Zoned Land: Means all land described in the Shire of Manjimup Local Planning Scheme No: 4.

#### Blue Dot Army Long Table Lunch

Having introduced Blue Dot Army and Crystal Howrie at the Pemberton CRC's inaugural Day Out for Women event in 2018, we have been asked to host a **LONG TABLE LUNCH (LTL)** for this group who has gone on to become a recognised charity and is doing fantastic work. With their partner the Metro Hotel they are now able to deliver cancer treatment "at home" to rural and regional patients. This allows the patient to have family with them away from the clinic as their treatment is administered.

**Blue Dot Army** takes a human centered, research-based approach to deeply understand the personal experiences of people affected by cancer and those who support them to identify the biggest opportunities for change. They partner with like minded cancer organisations and wellbeing advocates to achieve this. **Blue Dot Army** was established by Crystal Howrie, after her own experience with cancer left her determined to change the processes and improve the service experience of those undertaking cancer treatment. 'Blue Dot' represents the small tattoo a person with cancer must have to accurately guide the radiologist to administer radiation treatment. For many it is a painful and permanent reminder of their cancer experience. 'Army', represents the people who provide support to those with cancer – advocates, partners, volunteers etc. The butterfly is symbolic of change and represents end urance, hope and life.

An aunt of my mother's had this unusual, funny (or embarrassing?) story to tell. Great Aunt Mabel certainly did not think it embarrassing and retold the story at parties and gatherings with great enthusiasm and delight. It no doubt provided entertainment for the guests, and those who had heard it before, would prompt her to repeat the event. The younger generation found it more than just amusing.

Aunt Mabel considered herself attractive in her hey-day—claimed she always expected and received compliments and a second glance from her male

counterparts. She had a flair for dressing quite elegantly and considered herself the envy of other ladies. Friends rallied around her in admiration and often consulted her when special events required formal dress. This should give one a good idea of this flamboyant personality; but wait until you hear the story.



The story started when Aunt Mabel recalled a "very important appointment in the City. Meticulously dressed in her new chic sleeveless outfit, she boarded a City tram which was very crowded. She was compelled to take standing room downstairs in this double-decker tram, afraid to stumble on the stairs. Besides, she did not want to ruin the high heels of her genuine leather sandals! Holding firmly onto the chrome bar overhead to maintain her balance, she kept her feet apart and was guite comfortable. Her bag, made of crocodile skin, was slung over her left arm and we could imagine how she flashed the fold and diamond rings on almost all her fingers. Aunt Mabel added that her 'Dior' inspired attire fitted her figure perfectly and she sensed that all eyes were on her as usual, (unbeknowing for a different reason may I add).

Apparently Aunt Mabel had turned down the offer of a seat from more than one gentleman. In hindsight, she thought that it was indeed foolish to do so. A few minutes into this (show off) balancing act, trying to remain steady, she noticed several commuters who

were facing her, were smiling. Thinking they were unusually friendly, Aunt Mabel returned the smiles. Gradually the smiles turned into giggles and glances towards her upstretched arm which was holding

One thing for sure, Aunt Mabel had a unique way of getting attention and keeping her audience entertained.

'CHARLIE BURNS'

His Life and Times

On the 21st November the book 'CHARLIE BURNS, his life and times' will be launched at 'Charlie's in the Pemberton Hotel from 5.30 to 7.30pm. Where else should it be ? So all people who remember Charlie are welcome to come and recall this remarkable man who loved Pemberton and the surrounding forest and wildlife. Charlie was a brilliant man on the football field, a splendid horseman and a man with whom children loved to spend time. Few people knew that he came to Perth from the Kimberley in 1902 after his mother died. He was brought up by Frederick Slade Brockman's family and sent to Guildford Grammar School.

The book follows Charlie's life together with his time in both World Wars and his help to do such things as survey the railway line to Northcliffe, to bring back lost cattle, to assist any people needing help on a farm and even to rescue some children fishing when they were washed out to sea. It also brings in the historical features of the period from the confrontation between aboriginals and the settlers up north, to living in Guildford, joining the 10th Light Horse in WW1, helping the Warriors win the finals of the 1937 SW Carnival at Bunbury and becoming a splendid bushman at home in different shacks around Pemberton and Northcliffe. He was happy to be with us all.

## Pemberton General Store Grand Opening





#### How Times have Changed!

The following article which was reported in the *Manjimup Mail* on Friday 25 April, 1947, is an interesting example of how "times have changed" in relation to some of the vocabulary used in the article, and the form of entertainment that was popular in the 1940s following the end of World War II. At this time the "wireless" (radio) was the only form of media available. Picture theatres were popular and entertainment in the home for both formal and informal gatherings was the norm.

## Golden Wedding

Celebration at "Finsbury" Finsbury, the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Kammann for over forty years, was the scene of a gay celebration on April 12, when about 50 friends and relatives gathered to congratulate them on the proud occasion of their golden wedding. Distant relatives were represented by Mr. and Mrs. Ferris of Sydney who were holidaying at Finsbury.

Card players were adequately catered for in the spacious library while games, community singing and dancing were enjoyed in the dining room to the strains of music by Mr. and Mrs . Weston.

Pride of place on the laden supper table was given to an exquisite 2-tier wedding cake. After the Loyal Toast, Mr. Red, who acted as M.C. called on Mr. Arch Chatley, and Mrs. Stephenson as old friends of the family, to propose the health of the guests of honour. Mr. Chatley paid eloquent tribute to the wonderful work accomplished by Mr. and Mrs. Kammann, and their beneficial influence on the district.

He was ably supported by Mrs. Stephenson, who conveyed the congratulations of the ladies present, and also the absent members of her own family. The toast was then accorded musical honours and amid much acclamation, Mr. Kammann was called upon.

Reminiscing over the years he modestly disclaimed any special abilities, but said he'd plodded along, and, under the smile of Providence, the place had grown.

He spoke of the almost unbelievable changes that had taken place in the district, since he and Mrs. Kammann settled here in 1906. and stressed the need,

in his. opinion, for a strong white population in Australia.

The bride of 1897 cut the cake and music and dancing were resumed. Solos were rendered by Miss Rene Paddon who sang "I'll Walk Beside You" and "A kittle Love a Little Kiss," and Mr. Kammann who sang "Star of Bethlehnm" and "O'Solo Mio" -

both singers literally excelled themselves. Mrs. Weston acted as accompanist in her capable manner.

The singing of Auld Lang Syne in, the early hours< of the morning brought the happy gathering to a reluctant conclusion.
