This poor darling who has only just turned 21, has had to undergo all the tests and procedures relating to finding out what was wrong with her, without her Mum at her side. She is a student at Melbourne University and her Mum lives in Perth. Thankfully she will be coming home this week and while having to isolate for 14 days, she will be home for Christmas with her Mum.

As of the 5th December our building will be like so many other business where our customers will have to scan or sign in as part of contact tracing for COVID-19. This will be an onerous task, especially at the Visitor Centre end of the corridor, and I hope that our customers will show patience and good sense and not give our staff any grief as to why they don't want to participate, and what a waste of their time this will be. There will also be the donation of toys to be distributed, all of which will keep the CRC busy and help to spread the cheer and goodwill that others are willing to share. See, this is what Christmas can do, and I hope with all of my heart that we as a nation never turn our back on it.

We might be coming into the holiday season but this office remains busy and in touch with the needs of the community. While one day I will be like Diocletian and tell you my cabbages are more important than anything else, and while I wait for Telstra to get their act together, I will continue to be grateful for the opportunity to serve our community wherever possible.


Pemberton Visitor Centre Update

Art and Science (Did You Know????):

Studies have shown that an immense amount of creativity is needed to make scientific breakthroughs.

Conceptualising, visualising and imagining certain processes are important to solving scientific problems. Clearly Art marries well with Science and is often a product of scientific knowledge. Some simple examples include mixing paint to create colours, creating perspective or studying anatomy to complete a figure drawing.



Artists are well-recognised in our region, but now Pemberton can boast its connection to award-winning physicist David Blair, professor at the University of Western Australia and Director of the Australian International Gravitational Research Centre.



For almost 4 decades, Professor David Blair has owned and regularly visited his property in the stunning Pemberton forest. It was during the 1980's that he began his journey into gravitational wave research in Australia, building an early detector in Gingin (Western Australia).

"Never did I guess that 40 years later I'd still be trying to detect gravitational waves." **Congratulations** to Professor Blair and his 3 colleagues for receiving the **Prime Minister's Prize for Science 2020**. Recognized for their work over more than 30 years, Professor Blair

and his team researched and developed technologies which were instrumental in the detection of gravitational waves in 2015. The team included the first female physicist to be awarded Australia's top science prize. Professor Blair said the success of this amazing project was attributed to the hard work of a team of people and the support of his university – UWA.



MEDIA RELEASE

Our annual beach clean up was held here in Pemberton over the 20-22nd November with the fantastic team from Trackcare WA joining us once again to scour our beaches and pick up rubbish. Over 20 people joined us over the weekend and assisted in collecting rubbish from Callcup and Yeagarup Beaches. Around 500kg was collected with the noticeable difference in the types of rubbish compared to previous years.

We have been cleaning the Yeagarup side with Trackcare for years – and it was noticeably spotless, only 2 bags collected for the journey from the track to the river mouth. However this year was the first time volunteers had seriously tackled the Callcup side of the Warren from the track to the mouth and it was where the majority of the rubbish was collected.

Traditionally we collect a lot of commercial boat rubbish, toilet duck and brushes, long lengths of rope and broken fishing pots. We had a small amount this year however disappointingly we found a lot of rubbish including cans and bottles left behind by campers and fisher people. With the 10c can collection available it makes it easy to recycle cans and bottles - and there should be no excuse for littering as our local schools are now fundraising using the 10c cans and bottles our community consume. A massive thank you once again to Grant from Trackcare WA for organising the Volunteers from Trackcare to head to Pemberton, Parks and Wildlife for their assistance with trailer hire, signage and park entry, Tangaroa Blue Ocean Care Society for their data collection and Keep Australia Beautiful Council for organising the insurance waivers that make this all possible.

Its on again next year – so if anyone wishes to join us just let us know!


All these have been made possible by bringing the Vic Conte Community Garden back under the administrative umbrella of the Pemberton Community Resource Centre.

The following is a letter written to the New York paper "The Sun" and the acknowledgement Tuesday September 21 1897.

Dear Editor: I am 8 years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says, "If you see it in THE SUN it's so." Please tell me the truth, is there a Santa Claus? Virginia O'Hanlon 115 West-Ninety-Fifth Street



Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the scepticism of a sceptical age. They do not believe except what they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's are little. In this great universe of ours, man is a mere insect, ant, in his intellect as compared with the boundless world about him, is measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! How dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus. It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias.



There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The external light with which childhood fills the world would extinguished.

OUT OF THE MOUTHS OF BABES

During my second year as a pre-school teacher in South Africa I worked with one of the most amazing



delightful groups of five year olds. They were bright, responsive and inquisitive. The learning environment inside and outside was explored with great enthusiasm. At story time they sat wide eyed

(and wide mouthed) lapping up every word, and following every action made with the story props.

I had a good relationship with my young learners. There were regular requests about the children's progress in spite of the fact that some parents had had limited opportunities for schooling. They were keen that the next generations would have a better education and a good start in life. I have no doubt the children shared classroom experiences in their homes. Parents made comments about how "clever" their offspring were becoming since attending this Early Learning Centre.

Towards the end of the year we prepared for the Nativity Pageant. The event was preceded by the Christmas story as well as singing Christmas carols. The parents saw the humour in the two incidents (out of many) I am sharing and I trust our readers will as well.

The group of 15 five year olds sat spell-bound listening to the story of Joseph and Mary who had travelled so far looking for shelter and a place to stay.

I should mention that the community in which I worked was in a Municipal area with a Housing Office. Residents paid their rentals here and applied for lowcost housing when moving into the area.

To find out whether the children had been listening attentively I asked:

"Where did Joseph and Mary go when they found a place to stay?"

Cheryl jumped up with excitement: "I know, I know," she repeated with vigour, waving her hand in the air to get

attention. Before I could ask for her answer she cried out loudly and with confidence: "The Rent Office."

As amusing as it was, it was a reality for the children. They all nodded in agreement and admiration and clasped their hands together waiting for my response. I spent a few minutes explaining what happened in Bethlehem and showed colourful illustrations of the Nativity scene and thanked Cheryl for her enthusiastic response.

At the end of the story we practised a few Christmas carols. *Away in a Manger* was followed by another question to stimulate these enquiring minds. They were very chatty now because they were going to sing on a stage, albeit a makeshift one.

"Children, before we arrange the wooden boxes for our stage I have another question for you. Who knows what cattle are? Remember, we've just sung 'the cattle are lowing' and the baby Jesus woke up!"

Once again Cheryl jumped to her feet. This time she took my hand and led me into the adjoining classroom kitchen, with the entire group in tow.

Beaming at me, and pointing to the electric whistling kettle she announced with pride, "That's the noisy cattle, teacher!"

Right there in the kitchen a second language lesson took place. Fortunately the milk bottle on the bench near the kettle had a picture of two cows on it. It was an easy impromptu lesson on pronunciation including the concept of singular and plural as well.



I've often had to deviate from my lesson plan to meet the needs of the children's vocabulary. 


