- The Barista Course goes from strength to strength.
- Australia Day concert where everyone goes on this day to celebrate with friends and family at the pool.
- The Unearthed Festival. This forever changing festival saw some fabulous events with that famous Epic Cheese & Wine night at Hidden River and the Street Market sausage making day with Vince Gareffa.
- Marketing via TV & Print media now an integral part of the PVC DNA with annual budgets exceeding \$25k per annum.
- The Women's Day out.
- The Street Parties....and who could forget the fun and fellowship we enjoyed on these occasions with local businesses putting on a show.
- The New Year's Eve fireworks. Generously sponsored by the Pemberton Hotel for many years will now be run by the PCCI and part underwritten by the PVC and PCP.





- Mt Bike Park. The park continues to grow in stature as a must ride venue for amateurs to riders at all skill levels. 4
  major events are held annually
- 1. February The WAGE Gravity Enduro Mtb event with some 300 competitors
- 2. March The XCO or Extreme Cross Country with 240 riders over two days
- 3. October The Pemberton Trail Fest with the Perth Trail Runners attracting 329
- 4. Nov WA State Cross country marathon with 122 riders.

  If you add those numbers up and multiply by four, that will provide you with numbers these events bring to the town and its supporting businesses.
- Trails the trails town scheme is well advanced with Pemberton part of a unique national and world trail programme for travellers. This is not just Mt Bikes but includes walking, food and wine in the mix. Naturally the Bibbulmun track and Munda Biddi are key elements of the plan

Between Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> and Tuesday 11<sup>th</sup> November, Pemberton welcomed members from the Vistage Group who belong to the 700 CEO members of Vistage Malaysia. ## **Circles of Light**

In 2018 the Pemberton Chamber of Commerce and Industry approached Pemberton Arts Group Inc. with the idea of creating new and interesting Christmas lights for our Community. The PCCI had been successful in obtaining a Grant from the Shire of Manjimup.

We selected Circles of Light as the theme as circles are a universal symbol, considered sacred and divine, acceptable to all belief and value systems. It represents the notion of totality, wholeness and inclusivity of the universe.

A circle (bike rim) is the framework for these sculptures and reflects and emphasizes the strong connection of on and off-road bike riding in this area.

Many hours later, and after workshops, design trials and trolling the internet we found materials and tools suitable for our designs. These needed to be robust, sustainable, colorful, use light sources and be within budget.

PAG has proposed this as a three stage project ending in 2023. We will add to the Circles of Lights annually as money is available.

Our plan is that these sculptures will benefit the Festive Season for our Community, local businesses, attract tourists and support the work of the Shire of Manjimup and our local Artists. We will leave the lights in situ until after our towns New Years Eve celebration.

We hope you enjoy this new sculptural project and have a chance to thank those members of PAG who have contributed: Anna Czerkasow, Paul Nolan, Elaine Steele, Bill Bennitt, Jeanette Evill and Joanna Box.

GSI DataBar is a barcode which enables fresh produce to be identified and quickly and accurately scanned at the Point-of-Sale in a retail environment. The DataBar is incorporated into a produce label and is now a requirement for certain produce lines sold through chain stores. GSI DataBar enables growers and packhouses to differentiate their products at POS, as the label depicts the packhouse name.

The SFFC has been working closely with members to develop cobranded DataBar labels which are now available in store. We are always on the lookout for eco-friendly labels and will notify

our members as these options arise. If you need help navigating your way through the world of barcodes and label designs, please get in touch with the Food Council and we can work with you every step of the way.



#### From January 2020 your WA Free Travel vouchers will be going digital

#### How do I register?

Visit a Transwa Booking Centre, complete online at transwa.wa.gov.au/Pensioner-Free-Travel or ask one of our friendly staff on board for a registration form.

#### What am I entitled to under the scheme?

All registered WA pensioner concession cardholders are entitled to one return or two single trips per calendar year. DVA Gold Health cardholders have additional free travel entitlements.

#### How do I book my free travel in 2020?

Bookings on Transwa services can be made online, by visiting a booking centre, accredited agent or by calling 1300 662 205. Advance bookings are required prior to the date of your intended travel.

## Can I still use my WA Free Travel Vouchers from Centrelink or DVA if I have not registered with Transwa?

From 2020 you must be registered with Transwa to receive Pensioner Free Travel on Transwa services. Transwa will calculate your travel entitlement each calendar year and you will not need to provide a paper voucher.

## Have you seen this plant?

Pokeweed (*Phytolacca americana*) has recently been found in the Balingup area. This is a new weed for Western Australia. A collaborative program to eradicate this weed is now underway with government and industry working together.

The aim is to control all pokeweed plants prior to them setting seed this summer.

This plant is toxic to both humans and livestock and can contaminate agricultural produce.

#### What to look for

- Large perennial shrub up to 2.5 metres.
- Large bright green leaves (up to 40cm long) on a smooth purplish stem.
- White to magenta flowers in elongated clusters that hang from the branches.
- Deep purple black berries form in summer and are the most distinctive characteristic.


#### Similar weeds

Pokeweed is similar to inkweed (*Phytolacca octandra*), which is a widespread weed in the South West. Pokeweed is taller, has larger leaves, and the berry stalks hang down.

#### Help to eradicate this weed!

- Be aware of any new or unusual plants.
- Note the location of the plant (using a GPS if possible).
- Take photographs (leaves, flowers, fruit and whole plant).
- DO NOT collect seeds, berries or leaves as they are all poisonous.

#### Rights of Nature and Future Generations Bill Introduced in Western Australian Parliament

Diane Evers, a Member of the Western Australian Parliament, has introduced a Bill to recognise the Rights of Nature and Future Generations. This is the first time that legislation aiming to recognise the rights of nature has been introduced in an Australian Parliament.

The Australian Earth Laws Alliance (AELA) is working with communities and organizations in Australia, to advance the Rights of Nature. AELA assisted with legal and drafting advice for the legislation and congratulates MP Evers for introducing the Bill.

The "Rights of Nature and Future Generations Bill 2019" would secure the Rights of Nature to "exist, flourish, regenerate, and evolve," and provide the people and government of Western Australia with the ability to defend and enforce these rights on behalf of Nature The Bill recognises the rights of First Nations Peoples to speak for and defend their ancestral lands, and the Rights of Nature. The Bill also recognises the rights of present and future generations to a healthy environment, and includes a clause relating to the "precautionary principle" by stating that "lack of full scientific certainty shall not be used as a reason for denying or postponing the implementation, defence, or enforcement" of the Rights of Nature.

MP Evers explained that, "This is a necessary step in protecting the future of our planet and future generations as the current system is not working. We continue to see environmental destruction and actions that ensure continuing climate impacts."

Dr Michelle Maloney, of the Australian Earth Laws Alliance, stated, "Around the world, we are seeing an increasing number of Indigenous peoples, communities, and countries introducing Rights of Nature laws. These laws improve upon the current legal system, where nature is merely human property that can be used up until there's nothing left. Rights of Nature laws redefine what environmental protection means: putting the health of the living world at the centre of society, so that present and future generations of people and all other living beings can have a liveable, healthy and biodiverse planet to live on."

## **History Corner** (Bill Bryant) **Celebrating Christmas**

It's common practice to say 'Merry Christmas', whether it's in person, in a Christmas card, or online. The greeting originates in 1699, when an English admiral first used the term in an informal letter. The phrase was then used in Charles Dickens' 'A Christmas Carol' in 1843, and has rapidly grown in popularity since then.

Christmas Day is a holiday in many, but not all, countries. Many homes have Christmas trees and other decorations in the weeks leading to Christmas Day. Some workplaces hold Christmas parties prior to December 25. Festive activities include exchanging presents, singing Christmas Carols, going to parties.

It's a special time when children get presents from family, friends and Santa Claus or Father Christmas. For some, Christmas is an exclusive family affair, while others invite friends to a Christmas buffet or pot luck meal. Churches have special services and may include a crèche or miniature Nativity scene.

#### **About Christmas Day**

Christmas celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ, who Christians believe is the son of God. His birth date is unknown because there is little information about his early life. There is disagreement among scholars on when Jesus was born. Christians mostly celebrate Jesus' birthday on December 25; but Orthodox Christians celebrate Christmas Day on or near January 7, and in some countries the celebrations commence on December 6.

The word "Christmas" comes from the old English "Cristes maesse", or the mass of Christ. It is likely that the Christmas date of December 25 was chosen to offset the Pagan celebrations of Saturnalia and Natalis Invicti. It it also possible that the celebration of the birth of the "true light of the world" was set at the time of the <u>December solstice</u> because this is when the days in the northern hemisphere begin to grow longer. Christmas holiday customs derive from various cultures, including Teutonic, Celtic, Roman, West Asian and Christian.

#### **Images and Symbols**

Images of baby Jesus, the Christmas star, and other symbols associated with the religious meaning of Christmas are seen during the Christmas season.

The **mistletoe** is a commonly used Christmas decoration. By tradition, people who meet under a hanging mistletoe are obliged to kiss. Mistletoe has pagan associations. For example, the druids of Gaul regarded mistletoe growing on oak trees as sent from heaven. Other common decorations associated with Christmas are **holly** and ivy – both are associated with Pagan festivals as it was customary to decorate with greenery for these festivals.

Images of Santa Claus, snowmen, reindeer, and candy canes are also seen with the Christmas celebrations.

## Some brief interesting insights about Christmas traditions around the world

In Germany the Christmas tree is usually only put up and decorated at the homes in the morning of the December 24. Festive Christmas celebrations begin on December 24, on Christmas Eve.

In Italy, a nativity scene, a 'presepe', is usually put up in churches, town squares and often in homes. The nativity scene is a display with a crib filled with straw. 'Babbo Natale', (Father Christmas) hands out presents to children on Christmas Day, but in many families, gifts are exchanged only on 6th of January which is the Day of Epiphany.

**In Norway**, children wait for 'Julenisse', the Norwegian Santa Claus. On Christmas Eve, the 'Julenisse', brings presents to the children.

In Iceland, children put their shoes on the windowsill so the 'Juletide Lads', the Santa Claus, fills the shoes with little goodies. Christmas celebrations in Iceland start on December 24, Christmas Eve.

In the Philippines there is a special tradition of having a Christmas lantern, which is called 'paról'; the lantern is star-shaped, remembering the star of Bethlehem, and mainly made out of bamboo and paper.

In France, in many regions, celebrations start with St Nicholas day on December 6. It is believed that decorated Christmas trees appeared as far back as the 14th Century. On Christmas eve, children put their polished shoes out in front of the chimney and hope that *'Pere Noel"* fills the shoes with sweets.

Continuing our Semester 2 theme of Indigenous Studies, we were delighted to have Sonya Stewart, a Noongar local from Denmark who works for Parks and Wildlife, visit and run workshops with our Primary students. Sonya captivated our students with her local knowledge, language and stories. She showed many photos of important historical sites in our region with evidence of Aboriginal inhabitancy dating back thousands of years. Students were welcomed to country in language and shown traditional tools, boomerangs and digging sticks.

Our Year 4/5 students also embarked on the 2019 Aboriginal Cultural Tour, their first ever school camp. They travelled from Pemberton to Busselton via Nannup, then visited the Ngilgi Cave in Yallingup where their guide, Josh, taught them about the Indigenous history and significance of the amazing subterranean landform. Students also took part in a Koomal Dreaming Cultural Tour where they heard Dreaming stories, Indigenous music and learnt some cultural dance moves.

We were excited to have Zack from the WACA come to PDHS and conduct a Cricket Clinic with all of our Primary classes. The kids loved his games and were impressed by his skills. Thanks to Zack for travelling all this way to ignite our students love of sport and create so much enthusiasm for cricket. The kids learnt to throw, catch and bowl over the one-hour session, and would have been happy to stay out there longer.

Our Year 9/10 Outdoor Pursuits students braved the elements on their camp. Over two days, they planned and executed an expedition from the Leaning Marri campsite, navigating to Lake Yeagarup and the Warren Beach sand dunes. 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


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
