Nestled in the heart of the Southern Forest region surrounded by the magnificent Gloucester, D'Entrecasteaux and Beedelup National Parks, lies the jewel of the South West, the small, picturesque town of Pemberton....

....and what has this got to do with down town Pemberton you may ask . And as well you might?

Heads have been busy of recent times, or more literally the brains within them have been at the PVC and PCRC and our latest thought bubble to increase visitation to the region and plumb into the vast resources in the far north is a collaboration between us which will see the expertise and energies of that bright and rising star in the form of Pei-Chen. You should all know Pei-Chen by now as she is that energetic and bubbly lass buzzing around the resource centre doing all manner of jobs. The PVC is all about tourism and increasing visitor numbers for our member base and the community at large so apart from the constant advertising we conduct through the media streams we employ, we now hope to contact our northern neighbours to encourage them to come and pay us a visit.

CHINA DESK

To this end we have created the CHINA DESK within the Resource Centre as a marketing arm of the Visitor centre which will provide interpretive web services for the PVC members to modify their web site to include a page of interpreted text into Mandarin. Thus potential travellers can investigate our members properties and learn some of the things on offer in their own language. Should they require more information than the text provides, a contact email link will be created whereby they can make a written enquiry for the information and receive a response in their language, or contact a telephone number and have Pei-Chen answer the phone, speaking Mandarin .

When Pei-Chen isn't answering the phone, encouraging people to visit us she will be creating a new web site for the PVC and of course there will be much content in Mandarin. She will also have available to her a portal into the PVC booking system so that if enquiries turn into sales then she can book for the traveller to our PVC member properties or direct them to the operator for direct contact as required.

An Ordinary Postal Election will be held on Saturday, 19 October 2019 in the Shire of Manjimup to fill the following vacancies:

Central Ward	3 Councillors	4 year terms
North Ward	1 Councillor	4 year term
West Ward	1 Councillor	4 year term

Nominations Open on Thursday, 5 September 2019

Nominations Close at 4:00 PM Thursday, 12 September 2019

Nominations must be lodged with the Returning Officer:

- at any time during the above period by arrangement; or
- between 2:00pm and 4:00 PM Thursday, 12 September 2019 (close of nominations) at the Shire of Manjimup, 37-39 Rose Street, MANJIMUP.

Nominations Requirements

Candidates are required to lodge with the Returning Officer:

- a completed nomination in the prescribed form, signed and witnessed. (This form is available from the Returning Officer, the Western Australian Electoral Commission or the Shire of Manjimup;
- a single A4 page profile containing not more than 150 words of information about the candidate;
- a nomination deposit of \$80 (cash, bank cheque or postal order);
- a recent passport-sized photograph (optional).
- every candidate must complete the online candidate induction module available at www.dlgsc.wa.gov.au

The Commission has developed an online system called Nomination Builder to assist candidates to complete their nomination form which includes the candidate profile. This is the preferred method of completing the nomination form and profile for elections conducted by the Commission. Candidates complete their nomination details and profile, print the completed form which has a reference number allocated and lodge it with the Returning Officer. The nomination builder can be accessed at elections.wa.gov.au

Where an agent lodges a nomination on a candidate's behalf, it must be in the prescribed form with a written authorisation signed by the candidate.

The documents may be hand delivered, posted or faxed to the Returning Officer and must be received by the close of nominations.

History Corner (Bill Bryant)

THE IMMIGRATION RESTRICTION ACT 1901

The Immigration Restriction Act of 1901 led to the restriction of non-European migration, which became commonly known as the "White Australia Policy". Governments progressively dismantled such policies between 1949 and 1973. (A very brief history follows).



One of the reasons the six colonies had agreed to federate was concern that 'cheap' non-white labourers would compete unfairly with colonists for jobs. The combination of fear and self-interest among colonists meant that there was considerable resentment towards workers from China and the Pacific

Islands.

During the period of the "White Australia policy" non-Europeans travelling overseas needed to obtain a Certificate of Exemption from a Dictation Test (CEDT) to ensure that they would be allowed to return without taking a dictation test.

More than 38,000 Chinese-born people lived in Australia during Australia's gold rush period. The CEDTs recognised that many people who would otherwise be excluded from entry to Australia under the "White Australia policy" were either born here or were long-term residents of Australia and had contributed to its development

The dictation test was administered by customs officers at ports around Australia. Most people coming to Australia were not required to take the test, but those who were identified as 'undesirable immigrants' were required to write out a passage of 50 words. Those who failed the test were refused entry or deported. In the early years of its operation

Most Australians refer to the Immigration Restriction Act 1901 as the "White Australia Policy". Most people in the community know very little of the history of the restrictions imposed by this Act, although, it did not prevent Australian Aborigines, and Torres Strait and Pacific Islanders, working in Australia on plantations etc. in slave-like conditions.



nearly everyone who took the dictation test failed; after 1909 no person passed the test!

In the years after Federation it was recognised that Australia needed a bigger population to develop the nation economically. From 1911 financial assistance was made available to try to attract the 'right type' of migrants from Britain.

This 1936 cartoon reflects changing attitudes in the Australian community towards the dictation test. The test was a way for Australia to avoid being accused of racism because it did not name people from any specific race as being 'undesirable immigrants'; but the hypocrisy of this policy was recognised.

The test kept most non-Europeans from settling in Australia until 1958.

Although the dictation test was not used after 1958, it was still some years before Australia adopted a non-discriminatory immigration policy. Following World War II, the Australian government recognised the need for a bigger population and it adopted a large-scale immigration program. Changes in people's attitudes towards racial discrimination

became widespread in the Australian community. This led to both political and legal changes.

By 1975 the Australian Parliament had passed the Racial Discrimination Act and decisions about who could migrate to Australia were no longer made on the grounds of race or ethnicity.



WE HAVE MOVED!!



Proposal - Pemberton Food Growers group

In a nutshell this group will help you help yourself and others to get food gardening in Pemby. Would you like to join us and do you know non Facebook users that want to be involved?

While we love the Vic Conte Community Garden and are improving it currently, we recognise that most people want and need to be growing food in their own back yards where it is easy to pick at dinner time, can reduce food bills and increase health at home. We are hoping that we can grow a love and productivity in home gardens and their gardeners that will make the community garden a more useful and needed part of our local community. Whether it's the expert workshops, local gardener wisdom share, the seed bank, the tools share, or the new friendships, this gardening club should have something for everyone.

I would like to run this garden club on an alternate weekend (and day) to the Vic Conte gathering days so others might be able to make it that have had clashes on Saturday mornings. While its flexible I am proposing the last Sunday of each month 1-3pm (or later if its to hot).

The concept is to choose one of our garden club members gardens and help them get some food production happening with our people power. The Sylvester couple has been happily married for many years! They were close friends of my later Grandmother. She often told us stories about “the good old days” and this is one of them.

Mr Sylvester’s first name was Simon and his young lady friend then, who became Mrs Sylvester, was Sylvia Carter. She liked the sound of her new married name but there were several events that led up to their wedding day. This is one of them when Mr Sylvester tells of his attempt to put the first ring on Sylvia Carter’s finger and what followed. I will write it as he told it to my Grandmother.

‘I met this young lady at a party at a friend’s house. I first laid eyes on a striking young woman of medium height and dark hair. She wore a green satin dress and a pair of high heeled shoes and stood to one side of the room observing the dancing couples. I went up to her and offered her a chair which she gracefully accepted and this was an opportune moment for me to introduce myself. Stretching my hand out and raising my voice a bit above the gramophone music I said “Simon Sylvester miss!” “Sylvia Carter”, she responded coyly with a big smile. I took the hint and from then on we went for afternoon walks along the riverside and over weekends spent time on the beach during the summer time. Sylvia enjoyed the outings and as you can gather, so did I!

A few months later I felt our relationship was going somewhere as we got to know each other better through hours of conversations both witty and funny. I enjoyed Sylvia’s great sense of humour which brought out happy smiles, giggles and peals of laughter. This made my heart sing as well and I realised that she had become a tonic to my soul of which I could not get

enough. I decided that it would be appropriate to take the next step and bought a gold friendship ring with the tiny heart shaped charm I had seen in the jeweller’s shop window.

That memorable Saturday afternoon we strolled down the oak lined avenue in the City Gardens. We sat down on the wooden bench after feeding the squirrels I produced the ring. Sylvia looked surprised when I asked her to hold out her right hand and I proceeded to put the ring on her ring finger without even asked permission to do so. My line this time would be simple—“friends forever?”, but as the ring did not fit onto her finger I stopped short. I thought it would be embarrassing for Sylvia as it certainly was what I felt at that moment. We were both silent and I nervously put the little ring back into the box and into my coat pocket. Then I heard a giggle turn into laughter. “Silly Simon Sylvester” she laughed, and to my relief added, “You could have told me about your plan and I could have gone along to the jewellers to buy the ring!” I quickly apologised for my foolishness and gave Sylvia a first kiss—a peck on her flushed cheek!!

On our way to the jewellers the following week Sylvia asked me why I had bought the ring. I thought is was understood and said, “To seal our friendship”. “Well, it’s a joint decision isn’t it Simon?” At that moment I began to understand about what it means to be in a partnership.

We went into that same jewellers shop three times after that. PEMBERTON GENERAL STORE

OUR journey to move the Pemberton General Store to a more customer friendly home has finally come to a conclusion. This journey began four years ago with the purchase of the block at 66 Brockman Street, which we considered the perfect location. With the slope of the block being considerable, this perfect location came with its problems. Preliminary planning soon showed that the earthworks were going to be the biggest cost of the build and would require substantial retaining. But even before the building could start there was a great deal of planning to do. Our original plans were simply for a shop, but then we sold our house in Perth so decided to embark on some ambitious plans to include two apartments on top of the shop. With this our first commercial build, we learnt on the run and spent over 12 months dealing with surveyors, draftsman, undertaking water pressure testing, liaising with the Shire and much, much more before we would even know whether it would be worth going ahead. With this planning complete, we now had drawings which had put our ideas into reality and we were ready to seek out a builder so we could get some quotes to take to the bank. This step was relatively easy, but little did we realise that it would then take another year to secure finance following the Banking Royal Commission which resulted in all financial institutions tightening up on their requirements. Having exhausted all our options, including family, we found ourselves having to downsize the project back to our original plans for only a shop.

In the meantime, because our timeframes continued to blow out and after several generous lease extensions, our landlord finally had to finish our time at 52 Brockman Street. With limited options, we found ourselves moving to the old Millhouse Cafe building. Luckily the move happened in the school holidays so we had the help of our children who, although a great help, were glad to get back to school. It didn't take long for Lionel to realise we had more stock than would fit in our temporary building, so luckily for us, our shed at home was big enough to store the overflow. After 28 days straight, often working in the middle of the night to avoid daytime distractions, the old building was totally empty and we handed in the keys. It was made easier near the end by the generosity of a friend and some neighbours who brought us dinner on different occasions. We were totally exhausted but thankful that the task was over. After some rest it was back to some normality albeit in a new location.

With the essentials inside the old Millhouse Cafe building, we ended up overflowing onto the verandah and had to lease a sea container to house our popular plumbing and associated stock. Except for our diehard daily coffee customers, it did take some time for everybody to make the adjustment. By all accounts it was much quieter at the other end of town, which made us confident in our choice of location for the new shop. It was a relief to finally see the many truck loads of earth leaving the block. So whilst the shed went up quickly after this, of course the Pemberton winter weather led to some delays especially in transforming the mud pit out the front into a functional car park.

With the completion date moving several times we were relieved when we were finally handed the keys and got ready for the permanent move. We opened our doors for trading at the big red shed at 66 Brockman Street on Wednesday 7th August.

We have appreciated the loyalty of our customers during the move and trading from the lower end of town especially with the reduction in our normal stock levels. We also appreciate everyone's patience whilst we organise the new premises to give our customers the best range and easiest access to our stock. We now have a new gas stand at the rear of the building and it is being adjusted to suit our needs. Gates are to be installed to provide access from the laneway. Despite some negativity towards the car park, which is a Shire requirement, it does provide access to collect cement and other bulk goods from the front of the shop. Our potting mix and other gardening supplies are on the second level but can be loaded using the rear car park with access from the rear laneway.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our customers and friends who offered to assist with both moves. Whilst we didn't call on that help so much with the first move, mainly because we were



unsure of really the best way to do it and perhaps was something we needed to do at our own pace. During the more recent move, we were even more humbled by how many people were willing to help. The second move went much smoother with it being the second time around. I even planned ahead and had my mum come and stay for the first week to ensure we all got fed. While

we settle in, we are planning a Grand Opening for Sunday 29th September which is the first Sunday of the school holidays. By all means come and have a look before then but keep this date in mind as our way of saying thank you to our community.

Electoral Boundary Changes

Further to the proposed electoral boundary changes outlined in "Proposed Boundaries by District and Region" released in July, I am pleased to see the electorate of Warren-Blackwood largely remains as is, with the welcome addition of Balingup and surrounds. Final boundaries will be confirmed after a period of feedback; reporting no later than 25th November 2019.

Voluntary Assisted Dying Legislation

The Voluntary Assisted Dying Legislation is currently before Parliament and as your representative, I take my involvement with the debate very seriously. I have listened to many in my electorate and the overwhelming feedback is to support the legislation which I now do in-principal. As a legislator my responsibility is to ensure the details must be robust and include safeguards at all levels. We need to provide options for those who are seriously ill and in pain while at the same time protecting vulnerable people.

Busselton Margaret River Airport

Tourism is an important industry sector to our regional communities and I am disappointed the State Government is dragging its feet on announcing funding for the upgraded terminal. I commend the City of Busselton on their commitment to continue to negotiate with Jetstar to offer their service routes from the airport. Securing this carrier has the capacity to make dramatic change in increasing the tourism market and the State Government is now well overdue in showing their hand.

Bushfire Damage and Recovery

I have been very concerned to learn of examples where-by innocent people and their property have been adversely affected by fires under the responsibility of the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions, which was acting on behalf of the Forest Products Commission. It is totally unacceptable that the State Government can walk away from repairing the damage they have caused through their actions leaving farmers without fences and infrastructure through no fault of their own. I will be lobbying the State Government to address what appears to be a significant policy failure which sees innocent people worse off after active burning events.



PEMBERTON DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL

Every two years PDHS provides our Secondary students with the opportunity to travel to Canberra and Sydney. We believe exploring our national capital and seeing our federal democracy in action is an invaluable experience for all young people. Understanding civics in Australia and our responsibilities as democratic citizens is an essential life skill that should be taught in and out of the classroom.

Sixteen of PDHS's Year 8-10 students started Term 3 with a fantastic week visiting our national capital and exploring places of significance in Canberra and Sydney.

Our Secondary students began their week with two days in Canberra where they visited Parliament House, the Australian War Memorial, the Museum of Australian Democracy and the National Gallery. The group then spent three days on the snowfields in Jindabyne, completing lessons in skiing and snowboarding. Finally, our students spent two days in Sydney visiting the Opera House, walking across the Sydney Harbour Bridge and riding a ferry around Sydney Harbour. They also had a great time playing laser tag, indoor rock climbing, and visiting Madame Tussauds and Luna Park.

The cost of the camp was subsidised by the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate (PACER) program, which provides financial support for young Australians to visit the national capital as part of their Civics and Citizenship education with a focus on Australia's history, culture, heritage and democracy. Students, families and PDHS also fundraised for the camp. A very warm thankyou to Ms Foord, Mrs Guery, Ms Eiby and Mrs Mathieson who attended the Canberra and Sydney Camp with our students.



PEMBERTON “OLD” SCHOOL 100 YEAR CELEBRATION

Facts about the Building of the Pemberton School.

- WW1 1914 - 1918, a time of great uncertainty.
- As WW1 came to an end and people everywhere looked forward to peace at last .
- The community of Pemberton was growing very rapidly, families and single men were moving into the area for work .
- There was very little accommodation available . Boarding houses were full, men were sleeping on verandahs and people shared rooms while the Mill was working almost to capacity.
- The community , parents and the Mill management were concerned for the growing number of children not having a suitable school building nor housing for the teacher.
- There were about 70 children at this time attending school in the Mill Hall which was most unsuitable for learning .
- Parents , teachers and the Mill management were most unhappy.
- A Petition was got up by the community and sent to the Minister of Education in February 1919 for a allowance of a new school building, including accommodation for the headmaster .
- The petition was successful and astonishingly by the end of 1919, the school was built.
- The children and teachers moved in on the 19th December 1919a fantastic effort by everyone at the time.

With the exception of the want of the Free Stock already ordered, everything is now in thorough working order for the new school year.

With the completion of the building of the school, the Head Teacher, Mr Roberts wrote to the Director of Education explaining his delight that the teachers and students moved into the school building on the 17th December 1919. With the report that all broken furniture had been repaired and they were awaiting Education Department stock, they had everything in working order ready for the new school year.

You can only imagine the work that was done within the community to bring the building of the school to completion. Not much has changed really, we still see increased amounts of volunteer work being conducted throughout the community, and while we may not sign off our volunteer work in the same way that Mr Roberts did in 1919—Your Obedient Servant—we know that our community volunteers are always committed to achieving the best possible results for the entire community.



budget that will deliver the necessary capital and operating costs that meets community expectations and maintaining a minimal rate rise. We are committed to the best use of ratepayers money and it is important to realise that grant money is specific to certain projects and not available for general operations.

The rate payer expectations and Shire responsibilities are immense and often misunderstood, the population of the Shire is both diverse and dispersed. The Shire itself measures 7028km², of which approximately 83% is unrateable. Most WA local government authorities have their population predominantly based in one or two main town sites; however, the Shire of Manjimup has four main population centres, and seven other populated settlements, and encompasses a sealed road network of 512 kilometres and unsealed road network in excess of 800 kilometres. A significant amount to maintain, with a very limited income resource.

Finally, all processes are and must be transparent, and I encourage you to take some time to understand the process and reasoning of decisions made by your Council. The public is welcome to attend all Council meetings and agenda's and minutes are available online.

2019/2020 Financial Budget

At the meeting on 25 July 2019, Council adopted the 2019/2020 financial budget and approved a 3.38% rate rise. I assure ratepayers that any decision to increase rates is considered very carefully and is by no means a decision made just "on the night".

The budgeting process commences in March, when department managers are requested to pull together capital items for request and to project operating expenses for the next financial year. This is scrutinised by the Coordinator of Finance, Director of Business and Senior Management Team before the first draft and estimate is produced. The first draft usually results in a totally unacceptable rise in rates if it was to go ahead. Then begins the process of cutting items off the capital list and looking at ways to reduce operating expenses. We also factor in other sources of income, this year rates income makes up only 27% of the Shire's revenue, with grants making up 29%, previous years surplus 21%, reserves 5% and the balance from fees and charges.

A recent peak into one of the bulk commingled recycling drop-off skips at the Manjimup Recycling and Refuse Centre revealed an excellent level of purity. This suggests that Shire residents who use the facility are being diligent in properly separating out their household recyclable containers, paper and cardboard from all other waste materials.

There was almost no 'contamination' visible: no sign of plastic bags, food waste, or nappies - and, best of all, no bagged recyclables. The skip was full of loose recyclable items, meaning less useful material going into landfill and less extraction of raw natural resources.

Cleanaway have reported previously that our Shire recycles with greater purity than is generally achieved in the metropolitan area. This snapshot seems to suggest we are getting even better.

Take a bow, Shire householders; you deserve congratulations!
