Pemberton Community News

ANZAC Day is so entrenched in the psyche of Australians and New Zealanders and it feels strange not to be celebrating and acknowledging it here overseas. Obviously from the tense used here you will notice that I am writing while away from home. Those of my era have grown up with our grandfathers and parents all serving in the Army, Navy and Air Force services, that it is just part of our everyday lives. I do not glorify war in any manner, it is just a matter of honouring those who have gone before me and respecting the efforts that they have made towards serving their country in whatever capacity they were asked.

Many of you have stories that you share with children and grandchildren, but I think what is one the most poignant things when it comes to ANZAC day, is just how many of our small towns are affected during periods of conflict. In my mothers' case, a dairy producing family of 6 from Middlesex, had 3 serving members of the family away during WW2. This left my grandmother, aunt and an uncle too young to serve, at home to run and look after the farm on their own. My grandfather was a Major in the Australian Army, my uncle serving in the RAAF, training at Bomber Command flying Lancaster Bombers and then eventually using these to drop supplies to the men suffering along the Thai Burma Railway. After WW2 my grandfather served for another 12 years in Japan, engineering the rebuild of critical infrastructure, with Nanna joining him there for many years. They were there when Pop was called to oversee the troops leaving for Korea for that next of wars. And it was here that he had the awful task of sending his youngest son to Korea via Japan.

My little mum at 93 is now literally one of a handful of WAAF's — members of the Women's Auxiliary Airforce - in the country. These women did many jobs for the RAAF where there were no men to fill the role. Mum served all over the country doing both the exciting and the menial, with bedding and rations pretty bleak indeed. And while this family was fortunate to have all return home, many families did not. Because of WW2, my parents met at Pearce Air Force Base after my father returned from serving as a radio operator in the South Pacific. He never talked about anything really, which happened in many families, except to tell us that while they suffered on their meagre rations, the American troop carriers would come in with the supply ship following, carrying ice cream and chewing gum!

From all of it though, one of the nicest things is this; Mum is invited and escorted to Pearce Air Force Base for every graduation ceremony, where she dines with the Officers, watches the fly overs with their aeronautical manoeuvres which still excite her, and in her words "We are looked after with such respect and treated as if we were glass". I think that says it all, we should continue to respect and honour our Service men and women for the preciousness of safety and security, **Lest we Forget**.










Big Brook Dam Special Stage


























STAGE CLOSURE AND OPENING

Make Smoking History Targa
South West has permission from the
local government authority and the
Commissioner of Police to close the
roads for competition. All roads, gates
and driveways leading onto the rally
stage need to be closed off by manning,
taping and tagging.

To ensure the safety of the public, officials and the crews the following procedure will take place.

- Before the road closure time, unused gates will be tagged.
- At the road closure time the roads will be closed and officials will begin to tape and tag all driveways and gates.
- Before the rally starts each stage,
 Official Car 000, will inspect that all roads, gates and driveways have been closed.
- Official Car 00 will then check that all officials and the public are in a safe location.
- A few minutes before the stage starts,
 Official Car 0, with flashing lights and sirens will be a warning that the stage is about to begin.
- The Challenge Category (cars without roll cages) will start competing.
- After the Challenge Cars, the Competition Rally Cars will then compete.
- They will be followed by the medical team, Official Car FIV, to check on the safety of the stage.
- Once all competition is finished,
 Official Car SWEEPER with a GREEN FLASHING Light

will then traverse the stage notifying Officials to open up roads, driveways, gates and remove Chicanes from the road

The road will then be opened to the public.

Shade Stories

SunSmart is seeking shade stories

If you've ever been to your local playground or swimming pool and appreciated the shade, or lack thereof, Cancer Council WA's SunSmart team wants to hear about it.

The SunSmart team is seeking community feedback on the availability of shade at public outdoor places and open spaces in Western Australia.

The importance of sun protection

Overexposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun is the major cause of melanoma and non-melanoma skin cancer. This means that the majority of skin cancers in WA are preventable.

The SunSmart message encourages West Australian's to protect themselves when outdoors with sun protective clothing, hats, sunscreen, shade and sunglasses. Being SunSmart is particularly important throughout childhood and adolescence; a time when sun exposure plays a critical role in determining future skin cancer risk.

Sun protection is recommended when the UV Index is 3 and above. Download the free SunSmart App to keep track of the live UV Index in your area.

Seeking shade

Seeking shade is an effective strategy and, when used in conjunction with other measures, enables maximum sun protection to be achieved. Good quality shade can be created by a built structure (e.g. shade sails) or the natural environment (e.g. trees).

Manjimup—missing mail

The saga of the missing mail in Manjimup continues. My office is working closely with the Postal Industry Ombudsman and Australia Post National Resolutions team to determine the reason mail is going missing. Initially there was speculation mail was being stolen after delivery, however many items are not being delivered to locked boxes—so this theory does not fit all circumstances. It appears the issue is much more complex than originally thought—so the investigation continues. In regard to vehicle licencing, you can check when your vehicle registration expires by simply entering the plate number at https://online.transport.wa.gov.au/webExternal/registration/ I am sure the CRC can assist if you need help with this.

Regional Hospitals

In meeting constituents around the region, fears about the long term plans for our smaller regional hospitals have been raised. I hear stories about the tired condition of some of our older hospitals and suggestions they are understaffed.

I have written to the Minister for Health to seek assurance that the McGowan Government will support these vital health services and adequately fund hospitals in the region.

Support for people with disabilities

The transition to the National Disability Insurance Scheme is proving difficult for some families and a number of issues are emerging, especially in regional areas. Parents tell me the option to self-manage the funds is actually not an option for many people, as the paperwork is overwhelming and the level of reporting too onerous. Key areas I am seeking support is local access to an independent support person to help families broker personalised, tailored solutions within the parameters of the NDIS funding package; and access to funding for respite.

- Please have your items out at least one week before the collection date in a place on your verge that will not be a danger or an inconvenience to others.
- ◆ Please do not put any items out after the Monday start date for collection in your town as it may not be collected and a litter infringement and fine may ensue.
- ◆ A maximum of 3 cubic metres (1m x 1m x may be collected per property. Properties with more than 3 cubic metres will have to make private arrangements to have their waste removed. Items longer



- ◆ All items collected from the verge will be sent either to landfill or to resource recovery.
- ◆ Each household's waste items must be placed only on their own section of verge; households shall not add their excess waste to another property's verge area.
- Every waste item remains the property of the household which placed it on the verge

Beginning in 1923 at the State Mill No. 1 near Manjimup, with a hand-cranked projector showing silent movies, and finally closing at the Busselton Drive -In on Anzac Day 2015, the Allan Jones Circuit Pictures is believed to be the longest continuously running family owned cinema operation in the world.

The Pemberton Picture Theatre (also known as the Adyar Hall) was constructed in 1929 by Allan Jones; one of Western Australia's earliest travelling picture show men. It is the only purpose-built timber picture theatre left in Western Australia and demonstrates an important phase in the history of cinema entertainment in the State. The building operated as a picture theatre until the early 1970's.

The story of the exciting years of Allan Jones and his dedicated teams of travelling picture showmen is now being prepared as a book by **author**, **Daryl Binning**. It is intended to raise funds from the sale of the book to support community museums in those towns in the South West who relied on the regular visits by his projectionists for their entertainment.

Daryl will be in Pemberton on Tuesday 8
May to promote the publication and the public
is invited to meet with him at the Holy Smoke
Café in Dickinson Street (the Finecraft
Woodcraft Gallery) to view the book which
includes many illustrations, and to discuss the
history over a cup of coffee. An informative
and interesting video will also be shown.

"The Old Picture Theatre" now restored for apartments.
