## **Pemberton Community News**

Good news for the Pemberton CRC and all CRC's around the State. We all got together in Northam last week for an all day Conference and Networking Event with our principle funder Department of Primary Industry and Regional Development, and I have to tell you, it was one of the better conferences I have ever attended. The Minister Alannah MacTiernan spent the morning with us and assured all of the CRC's that funding is not going to end anytime soon, that they have made a commitment and will be honouring that commitment made available through the forward estimates beyond 2022. That was music to all ears, and gives added incentive to continue serving our community. Minister MacTiernan did encourage CRC's to always be looking and searching for those areas where we can add income and not be reliant on our State Government support. A new Traineeship Funding round is currently open, closing next week, so I had better get my grant writing skates on, which will see our CRC give the opportunity to another trainee in 2021-2022, all very exciting.

A panel of CRC's that seem to be working wonders in their communities, spoke to us and took questions. The guest speakers were brilliant, including Nigel Oakey, Managing Director of the Dome enterprise who encouraged us to "Be known for what you do, not just the big ideas" and asked us what is our "Brand Essence", "does anyone know what a CRC actually does?" Well we might run a Facebook competition on that one and find out just what you think we do or think we should be doing. The way managing a CRC feels—a lot of the time—is as Mike Tyson once said "Everybody has a plan until they get punched in the face". I know right? It makes a lot of sense.

I have some family down with us for a few days over the holiday period and I love having them all in the house. You can feel the vibe change and increase in tempo as you look around and see large people (all our grandsons are tall young men) talking with each other, laughing, arguing sometimes, sharing meals together and just generally hanging around. 

#### **Residential Tenancies Act**

The State Government has extended the emergency period under the Residential Tenancies (COVID-19 Response) Act 2020 until 28 March 2021. This means the existing laws, including the moratorium on rent increases and some termination of tenancies will stay until this date. Tenants not suffering hardships cannot take advantage of the crisis to avoid paying rent, and can still be evicted if they are causing damage. I am taking an increasing number of calls from 'Mum and Dad' investors who are equally feeling financial hardship. I have written to the Attorney General seeking some balance in addressing the impact of this moratorium.

#### **Stop Puppy Farming Legislation**

The title of this legislation is very misleading. No-one accepts puppy farming or the mistreatment of animals and on the face of it, this legislation should be adopted. The difficulty is in the detail—and in fact, the legislation does not actually address illegal puppy farming. It details mandatory sterilisation,

approval to breed, centralised registration system and transitioning pet shops to adoption centres. Recent media has highlighted how people are tricked into believing they are buying a dog from a registered breeder, but finding it has not been micro-chipped, vaccinated or even the breed they thought they were buying. This legislation needs a lot more work before we can support it in Parliament.

#### Worker Shortages

There is much angst in the regions as our two main South West industries, agriculture and tourism face unprecedented worker shortages due to the COVID-19 fall out. I have called for a Taskforce to be set up with representatives from industry to work with the State Government to explore ideas on how to best navigate this issue. This region needs workers such as truck drivers, cleaners, fruit pickers, café workers, kitchen hands and aged care support staff.

Right now we are all facing the same COVID storm, but we're doing so in different boats. Please be mindful of those struggling to keep afloat in these times. Aged support services

#### 17<sup>th</sup> Annual Spring Exhibition Preview Event:

An appreciative crowd of just under 90 People attended the official opening event. Due to Covid regulations, we were unable to invite our usual crowd, restricting our list to exhibiting artists, sponsors and Pemberton Arts Group members. Even so we had a waiting list!!

With 65 art works on display, this is a rich showcase of works from a range of South West artists: professionals, hobbyists and emerging artists. Judge Dr Ann Schilo (former head of Design and Arts at Curtin University) described the exhibition:

"The overall standard of works exhibited was very high. It was evident that all the artists have been developing their skills in seeing, in using media and materials and reflecting upon ideas. I commend the artists who have contributed work to the exhibition. They have put a part of themselves on display, their labours in the studio, their imaginations, emotional responses and insights. They all deserve the greatest respect.

The judging of the awards was extremely challenging given the high level of expertise on display. I was looking for work that not only displayed technical skills and time taken in the studio but also revealed elements that went beyond traditional practices; that suggested creativity in approach, where the hand and the eye, combined with imagination and ideas, revealed something new about the world around us."



#### History Corner - Bill Bryant

This month I am continuing with excerpts from '<u>Group</u> <u>Settlement, Part 2. Its People: Their Life and Times—An</u> <u>Inside View</u>' by J.P. Gabbedy, pages 27 to29. This month involves the Northcliffe area and the health/medical services.

Early in 1924 a young English couple arrived at Group 98. It was shortly before the birth of their first child. What they found was a far cry from what they had left behind them in England—a shanty settlement consisting of a double row of two-family huts facing each other across a clear space about 30.5m wide, and all about them the rall timbers of the bush they were supposed to conquer.

Perhaps they were not surprised by the physical aspects of their new home: they would have been led to expect something along the lines of what confronted them, but they might well have been aghast at the sanitary facilities which had been put in hand for the inhabitants.

The lavatory consisted of an open pit along one edge of which ran a stout sapling supported by a forked stick at each end: the lavatory seat. One of these conveniences—each for privacy surrounded by a hessian screen—was established at either end of the cleared space; one for the ladies, one for the gentlemen.

The danger this primitive arrangement posed in diseases carried by flies throughout summer and autumn was augmented by the behaviour of some of the inhabitants. Mrs Nell Hartland, an original settler on 98, told me that some should have known better, but that some were only showing off:

> Every morning at first light I took our chamber-pot, decently covered, to the lavatory to empty it. I never got there without someone yelling at me from a doorway: "Wotch hidin', Duchess?", or "Wot makes your drop any different from ours?" and so on. And then they'd empty their own chamberpots—as often as not the old standby, the cut down kerosene tin—right outside their front doors. They didn't mind if I got splashed, either!

In time there came about what anyone with only half a brain must have expected: a bout of gastroenteritis which carried off the first baby of the young English couple.

There was no medical assistance and no transport. The young mother and father, dressed in their best and carrying nothing but their dead baby wrapped in its shawl, left 98 without goodbyes or explanations. They walked the 9.6 km to Northcliffe, begged a lift to Manjimup and there buried their child. They never returned to 98—all they possessed in the world stayed where their world had ended so suddenly.

It was this incident and similar occurrences that prompted Faulkner (Field Supervisor) to contact Head Office by telephone to seek the Medical Department's assistance with a supply of trained staff. As the story goes, the response was that a detailed report must first be submitted. Ministerial approval would be required as there was no certainty as to where their responsibility lay, when it should be exercised, and to what extent they would be involved. When Faulkner got this reply, he nearly climbed through the phone. "To hell with the department", he raged. "Get on to the Bush Nursing Association." He knew that the Bush Nursing Association understood emergencies, that they were trained to act, and to leave decision making to the on the spot representative. "Give the nursing sister a train ticket", he ordered. "I'll put her on the wages sheet and meet all bills for equipment and food until you can get things sorted out. Make it clear they don't have to fund her salary."

inspired by the success of the Metropolitan District Nurses, organised by the Silver Chain League, first as general nurses and later with trained maternity staff. The league, entirely supported by voluntary contributions and State-wide fund-raising efforts, began operations in 1905. Its growth was phenomenal. Through its efforts and example grew the Children's Home for Orphans and Quarter-Castes, and Cottage Homes for the Aged; it is also claimed that the Silver Chain Maternity Nurses were the forerunners of King Edward Memorial Hospital. At some time between 1924 and 1940 the Bush Nursing Association was absorbed into the Silver Chain League. I might say that for anyone interested in the subject, the publication *Little but Great: Saga of the Silver Chain (1905—1965)* by Noel Stewart makes great reading.

Act they did and the recently qualified, double-certificated Sister Gertrude Hedley caught the next train, Monday, 17 March, to be met by Faulkner at Bridgetown. Overnight accommodation had been arranged at the Manjimup Hotel. Picked up after breakfast, she was driven to the Field Supervisor's intended but not yet occupied cottage on Lot 25, at the corner of North and Boronia Streets, which was to be set up as a temporary hospital.

There were five people awaiting her attentions: a young girl with pneumonia, and four men all victims of accidents. There were no medical stores beyond Sister Hedley's own private kit, and beds and bedding for the first five patients had to be borrowed from the Group Settlement staff quarters. Faulkner mover fast, however, once he was set in motion. Before the week was out the Cottage Hospital had been basically equipped and even boasted a surplus of beds and lockers which had to be moved into the adjoining cottage. Hospital facilities in Northcliffe had got away to a flying start—but much too late to save the little enteritis victim who already lay buried in Manjimup.

How could government planners—who are expected to have at least some experience in what they are attempting—have pitchforked people into such conditions. It is not difficult to conclude that those who enjoy the facilities of water closets and good hospitals serviced by good doctors perhaps find it difficult, or unacceptable, to realise that there are others who do not. In the *Government Gazette* of 1924—activated possibly by official conscience—the Public Works Department called tenders for the labour involved in the building of a Northcliffe Hospital.

The Cottage Hospital's first recorded birth on 26 April 1924 was of Margaret Elsie, daughter of Charles Thomas Stanton and Rose Maker Stanton of Group

100. The baby who then, as a matter of course, received the title of "Lady Northcliffe" is now Mrs Don Cocksley and the mother of two girls.



Margaret Elsie's mother recalls her confinement in the partly lined cottage room, lit by a hurricane lamp. The nursing and attention were excellent, but her first meal—of corned beef made her feel ill. Her three previous confinements had been in England, where the standard treatment had been soft foods and no meat for the first week after birth. When the complaint was recounted to Sister Hedley, that redoubtable lady snorted: "She was lucky to get what she did!"

The Bush Nursing Association he invoked was an organisation

#### The Boy in the Pink Shirt

Sixty years have gone by almost a lifetime. It feels as if it were just yesterday that my school friend Ruth and I were on school holidays. Nothing unusual about our outing, just a train ride to the beach. In fact, a thirty-five minute journey which included a number of stops along



the Cape suburban train line. This was the quickest way to the coast. In those days not many families owned a car and for two 14 year olds, an adventure. We were out for the day, unaccompanied by adults!

Clickety clack! Clickety clack! The train snaked through the suburbs, Clickety clack! Clickety clack, its wheels powered on the metal rail track. Fresh air wafted in through the open window and we both peered out onto red roof tops and manicured gardens. Our hair blew around our faces and I inhaled the familiar scents of the passing shrubs. An elderly lady sitting opposite us, narrowed her



eyes and peered over her spectacles with interest. Was she recalling happy, carefree days in her own youth? Perhaps she saw in us her own teenage granddaughters, I mused.

"Next stop Simon's Town!" came the booming voice of the ticket inspector, flicking his ticket punch playfully above our

heads, and with a friendly smile. "Out for a swim, young ladies?"

"For sure!" I responded, as we hurriedly grabbed our beach bags, bustling down the aisle to the nearest door. On the platform people were jostling to and fro. Some commuters rushing to board the train as the final whistle blew. Other locals looking out expectantly for visiting family or friends.

Ruth and I walked along the fast emptying platform and entered the subway marked: "To the beach area". We skipped down the steps, two at a time, laughing as our footsteps and voices echoed in the hollow of the tunnel. It led us onto the pristine sandy beach of Simon's Town (historically named after an early Dutch explorer of the Cape).

That year of 1960 was one of a close friendship Ruth and I shared with many more that followed. What

mattered today, though, was a lazy day, soaking up the long awaited spring sunshine and enjoying the invigorating waters of the cold Atlantic Ocean. We soon found a shady spot beside a huge boulder where we were protected from the cool sea



breeze. Ruth and I took turns holding up our beach towels like makeshift screens as we changed into our bathing costumes. A short distance away was a deep enough tidal pool which we claimed as our own private one and soon splashed and enjoyed our swim.

Suddenly a grey wire-haired mutt appeared from nowhere and joined us in the pool. Ruth shrieked out loudly. I laughed, patting the dog's as it paddled alongside. Sensing it had found friends, it jumped and joined the splashing all around us. Amidst our laughter and "Wirey's" yapping a shrill whistle rang out from somewhere. The dog's ears cocked. It spun around like a wound up toy dog and dashed off in the direction of its master's familiar call. We watched in awe as it bounded towards the white-washed cottages perched on the hilly outcrop above the beach.

Ruth and I dried ourselves and settled in our shady spot for a snack. Moments later the dog re-appeared, this time with another visitor in tow. "Wirey" dog kept running to and fro to ensure his master was following, as if to make a formal introduction.



He appeared no older than 17, and could have been my brother, I thought. He found us sitting sedately on our picnic rug. The dog instantly leapt onto Ruth, licking her face, tail wagging. She let out a shriek once more, shielding her face from the canine slobber with both hands. I jumped up

patting "Wirey" dog to calm down. The shadow of the tall young man fell over us. He was wearing a pink shirt and smiled at the scene before him. He reached out and gently drew the dog away from us by its collar. "You girls from here?"

We both shook our heads in unison, not ready for an impromptu conversation with a stranger. Perhaps we were just tongue-tied.

"I live up there", he said pointing towards the cottages on the hill. He did not say much more, other

than, "Sorry about my dog's behaviour," turned around and with a quick wave and last smile walked towards home, with his wirey mutt following at his heels.



In my imagination I created a happy conversation we all could have had. We had not invited the young man to join us so we

would never know what would have expired. As the time went by my friend Ruth and I often recalled that event. What if we had asked the young man to share our snack? What was his name? At 14, and after he had walked away, we sat there on the beach staring at those white-washed cottages and day-dreamed what could have been .....

We never did share our thoughts, only agreed on a name for him—simply, "The Boy in the Pink Shirt". Reflections on pleasant memories gives one fresh hope for the future. Life should be built on pleasant memories to share with those around you.

I enjoyed sharing this true story—a fleeting moment in the lives of 3 young people. Imagination is not our true life's journey. The journey of life is planned by the one who created us. That journey we accept, wherever it takes us.

I hope that you enjoyed the story of "The Boy in the Pink Shirt".

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
