With the strange situation of being in WA with closed borders West Australians are travelling within our state in large numbers, which is having a welcomed impact on tourism businesses, especially in Pemberton with lots of people about

even with the wet weather.

With Spring coming, the wildflowers starting to show and the warmer weather Pemberton businesses are enjoying the increased visitation. It is an unusual exciting time for Pemberton.

With the changeover to the new financial year you may have heard there has been a change in the Executive for the Pemberton Visitor Centre Board.

Three board members have stepped down after a long period working for the betterment of the Pemberton tourism industry. The members retiring are John Gaunt President, Secretary Don Box and Treasurer, Murray Johnson. All three have served a long period of time and have contributed to the success of the PVC and the Pemberton Caravan Park.

The PVC has commenced television advertising on GWN7 for 3 months to promote Pemberton within WA. The visitor centre is also working with the Southern Forests and Valleys Local tourism Association in their targeted television campaign.

A social media campaign is currently being developed with the aim of launching in September.

Front counter staff, along with the Pemberton CRC staff, have been undertaking famils. They are visiting local businesses to familiarise themselves with what is on offer and meet the operators to assist in promoting Pemberton.

Trail Town Project

In 2012 Pemberton was identified as having the potential to become a Trail Town in the "World Class Trail Hub Strategy" report, in addition, Pemberton is identified in the top three towns having potential for national significance in the South West Mountain Bike Plan.

Several stakeholders including Department of Local Government Sport and Cultural Industries, Department of Biodiversity Conservation and Attractions – Parks and Wildlife, Shire of Manjimup and Pemberton Visitor Centre have contributed funds towards the development of a Pemberton Trails Master Plan and Business Case.

This planning project will build upon numerous existing plans providing the clarity to propel Pemberton forward in its aspirations to become a trail town.

The Trail Town Project is moving forward and has tight deadlines. The request for quote tender for a consultant to write the Master Plan closed this week and the suitable business will be selected soon. The Master Plan is due in early December 2020 and

community consultation is an integral component of the developing the plan. The Trail Town Project includes different types of trail users.

The Trail Town Project has just received \$40,000 as part of the WA Recovery Plan towards writing the Pemberton Trail Town Master Plan.

The infographic featured on pages 16 & 17, was developed by the Pemberton Cycling Group with input from DBCA Shire of Manjimup, PVC and Westcycle highlighting possible outcomes from the Project.

Hi everyone,

We hope you're all keeping warm and dry in this recent run of winter weather. It's certainly added another element to our rides!

Maintenance work this month has focused on clearing fallen trees/limbs and addressing the swimming pools that have formed on some of the trails. Affected trails have been reworked and re-sculpted in certain sections to improve drainage and minimise the mud.



A significant trim and clearing for the first 300m or so of Nearly Gnarly has breathed new life back into the trail and reinvigorated the network on this side of the road. Although there is plenty more to go, the hard work that has gone into it is much appreciated by our regular and visiting riders.

The upper half of Wahoo has also benefitted from some alterations to reduce braking issues and improve the overall flow of the trail.

You may have heard the news that Pemberton is part of the mix in the WA state government's Tourism Recovery Plan announced in August. Along with developing and improving some existing attractions around the Pemberton area, a portion of this funding has been allocated to mountain bike trail planning and design in Pemberton. We're very excited and looking forward to seeing where this may take us!

Our social rides are still on every Saturday and Sunday mornings, with an open invitation for anyone to join. We will be hosting an AGM and planning workshop in mid-September – if you're interested in coming along, please get in touch via the email below.

Staff Shortages hurting businesses

The lack of skilled and unskilled workers in the South West is having a detrimental effect on businesses. Due to the lack of available staff, local cafes and restaurants are unable to open every day to cater to increased visitor numbers.

The Nationals asked the Government to consider a campaign to educate and offer ways in which Western Australians can work regionally, including training, worker accommodation and promotion of seasonal work. We also asked the Government to investigate possibilities of bringing people into WA under strict quarantine conditions, as many horticultural

businesses rely on skilled overseas workers for picking and pruning.

Help our people return home

My office is receiving calls every day from families who have been torn apart due to travel restrictions. People from this area are trying to get home from the Eastern States. They are there for family or work reasons—to support a daughter having a baby; to attend the funeral of a brother who died tragically; or to conduct highly specialised technical work. These people should have their travel passes approved so long as they agree to adhere to all quarantine requirements.

Book your holiday accommodation locally

Despite The Nationals highlighting the issue of overseas booking platforms price gouging accommodation providers, the Minister for Tourism pleaded ignorance and suggested

Tourism WA could report this activity to the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission. In some cases, online booking platforms are increasing prices by 37%, of which accommodation providers receive not a dollar extra. This is damaging to accommodation providers reputation, particularly as they are working hard to provide the best possible experience at the most reasonable value to visitors exploring our region. My advice—book your holiday with a local tourism provider or directly with the provider



PEMBERTON COMMUNITY GARDEN CLUB—AUGUST IN THE GARDEN

On August 16th we visited Katrina Zemke's house starting with a tour of her orchard where she is trialling green manures (grass, legumes and other plants growing) to activate the soil,



smother the weeds and then provide green feed for her chooks.

Katrina is a great experimenter so had lots of ideas to introduce to the group; banana circles, green manure, chickens in the orchard, sheet mulching to start garden beds, worm farms in bath tubs, and resulting compost / worm casting tea. We got to see the difference in

having a north facing protected winter garden

spot beside the thermal mass of a rammed earth home. Shown below you can see the plants did not even know it was winter.

After a great tour of her growing spots we learnt how to make the worm casting tea, which involved getting the castings (worms carefully removed) and putting a few handfuls in a cloth bag, adding it to a bucket with some other goodies and then aerating the mix for 24hrs with a aquarium aerator.



You can look up more details about this way to make a great probiotic for your soil even usable on natives this mix can go on the garden with a watering can (the bucket size) or be injected into your orchard



reticulation (fertigation) on a massive scale (the 200l blue drum size), search Compost Tea or Worm Tea on the internet for some recipes.

The September 20 meeting will be at Forest on Conte where Charles and Jolene are living. We will be helping plants some crops for spring summer growth and sharing cuttings and seeds.

We are hoping to tee up a meeting and tour of Manjimup Community Garden on October 17th (NOTE a Saturday) to see what they are doing there and compare notes about

On the 1 October 1993, a mere 27 years ago, Fernando and I with our three small children Karleha 9, Jack 5 and Laura 3 took over the Pemberton Garage and Service Station from the Shuttleworth family.

Soon we will be handing over the keys and starting a new chapter of our lives. It has been our labour of love, and, through ambition and hard work we have transformed the Service Station into what you see today.

Over the years we have made many changes to the Shop area, making it unrecognisable to what it looked like when we bought it in 1993. The first project that we undertook not long after taking ownership, was removing the old 'Wheel In Café', transforming the area into an office and storage for spare parts. This space is now where the camping and spare parts are located. In 2000 we removed interior walls to create more shop space. By removing the middle garage bay and incorporating it into the showroom area, this allowed us to become more diverse in our product range, rather than just selling spare parts. In 2015 the Outdoor Payment Terminal was installed allowing fuel to be available 24 hours a day. This allowed everyone to access fuel whilst we could spend part of our weekends and Christmas Holidays away from the Service Station, and be with our family. And more recently in 2019, we completed the mammoth task of

transforming the tired shop front and forecourt of the Service

Station, including installing new tanks. This is what you see today.

Our 27-year dedication to the Service Station has allowed for the above changes to come fruition, but all of this would not have been possible without our parents support and guidance. Without them we would not have been able to operate seven days a week and perform those massive renovations all whilst raising our family. Our parents would look after our children after school, on weekends and on the Christmas Holidays, so we could work. They would always park in the driveway and call in for a chat and lend a helping hand whenever we needed it. It is with deep sadness that we acknowledge that our fathers Gino and Charlie, who are no longer with us, missed out on seeing the recent and final change that we have made to our second home.

And to our son Jack, thank you. You have been by our side helping us from the day we took over the Service Station. You have grown up in the garage, from annoying your Dad as a boy to completing your apprenticeship and managing the business so we could take holidays. We definitely could not have done this without your passion for mechanics and ability to take control when we


needed you. We love you and wish you all the best for your next chapter as well.





Summer times are fun filled times when children enjoy playing outdoors. I recall many good times, playing in the sunshine with neighbourhood friends. There were fun

things to do in Winter too, like reading, drawing, playing cards as well as the favourite telling of yarns!

Being as active as any seven year old, and with a streak of adventure, I preferred the outdoor life. Saturday


